#### MIDTERM ELECTIONS AND BALLOT MEASURES

I don't know about you but it seems this year is zooming by really quickly. It is already Fall which means crisp weather and returning rains, pumpkin spice everything, Halloween candy, and most importantly, General Election Day is right around the corner. To be prepared here are some important dates to mark on your Portland JACL calendar:

- October 16: Last day to register to vote in the General Election
- October 21: Portland JACL/Chinese American Citizen Alliance (CACA) Ballot Measure Forum, 3:00 pm, Oregon Buddhist Temple. Refreshments served.
- November 6: General Election Day!

In order to register to vote in Oregon you must be a US citizen, an Oregon resident, and older than 18 years of age by November 6. It's easy to register online at the Oregon Secretary of State website if you have an Oregon driver's license or ID card. If you do not have either you can fill out a voter registration form at your county elections office. If you previously registered you should make sure your information is up to date, especially if you've moved since Oregon is a vote by mail state.

Voting by mail is easy and convenient but I have to admit I sometimes miss the ritual of walking to a polling place and stepping into the booth behind the red and white striped canvas and marking my ballot. I used to walk over to Manoa Elementary School with my parents while they voted and many years later took my boys to a neighbor's garage in Granada Hills to cast my ballot. Now it'll be just me and my husband voting at the kitchen table with the Voter Pamphlet and a cup of tea nearby. I hope my boys will be voting in their homes as I also hope all my fellow JACLers will be too.

Historically we know that nonpresidential mid term elections have lower turnouts. The last mid term election in 2014 had just 70.90% of registered voters voting in Oregon. This is compared to 80.33% in 2016. In my opinion this is still a very low turnout for exercising the privilege of participating in our democracy. I think back on my grandmother who immigrated from Japan in 1918 but was ineligible to apply for citizenship until after World War II. One of her proudest moments was when she finally became an American citizen in 1960 on her sixtieth birthday.

Even if we are not voting for president this year there are many other races and ballot measures we will be making decisions on. We will be electing our Governor, State Senators and Representatives, US Representatives as well as city, county, and Metro electeds and judges. Local and state politics are important and are just as impactful as national politics.

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Research the candidates by looking at their voting records, past statements or coverage on issues you care about, endorsements by trusted people and organizations who share your values, and debates or town halls if those are available.

This year there are five statewide ballot measures, a Metro bond measure, two City of Portland measures, Riverdale Fire District levy, and two Lake Oswego charter amendments. At the JACL/CACA Ballot Measure forum on October 21, a nonpartisan, neutral party will be explaining the measures and answering your questions. We urge everyone to come and learn more about what these measures are, how they could affect you and to help inform your vote. Look forward to seeing you there!

AgriCulture: Shaping Land and Lives in the Tualatin Valley

The Washington County Museum is excited to announce a new exhibit, AgriCulture: Shaping Land and Lives in the Tualatin Valley, which will be open to the public from September 27th, 2018 through spring 2019. Visitors to this dynamic, colorful exhibit will be able to touch, hear, see and learn about agriculture and the many ways it impacts our communities. Since time immemorial people in the Tualatin Valley have used their labor and technology to maximize the amount of nourishing food and valuable plant products that grow in this fertile area. Those efforts have re-formed human habits and social structures as well as the physical landscape.

This interactive exhibit centers on eight oral histories drawn from the museum's archive housed within Pacific University's digital exhibits. These individuals, some historic and some contemporary, speak to the field of agriculture through their personal experiences and the experiences of their families and ancestors. Together they become a dialogue across time, culture and technology that highlights many facets of agriculture's impact on us all.

"So many different cultural groups have participated in food and resource cultivation over the history of the Tualatin Valley that we knew we could not create a single narrative for this exhibit that could reflect them all," says Molly Alloy, Community Engagement Coordinator for the museum and Guest Curator of this exhibit. "Our hope is that by letting individual voices express different perspectives on agriculture we can show that the industry as a whole impacts each of us, but in different ways."

Allen Hendershott Eaton's historic 1952 book, Beauty Behind Barbed Wire: The Arts of the Japanese in Our War Relocation Camps, explored arts and crafts created by Japanese Americans while wrongfully incarcerated in the World War II American concentration camps. In the course of conducting research for the book, Eaton amassed a significant personal collection of artifacts.

After many years of lying forgotten in storage, the collection was put up for auction. An outcry arose from the Japanese American community, who rallied successfully to stop the insensitive sale of these important artifacts of Japanese American history. Ultimately, the collection was transferred to the Japanese American National Museum for safekeeping.

The Contested Histories display includes physical or digital representations of objects in the Eaton collection: photographs, sculptures, artwork, and other items handmade by Japanese Americans. In addition to providing an opportunity to see the collection that inspired such strong emotions and decisive actions, Contested Histories is intended to gather as much information about each object so that the efforts to preserve and catalog the collection can be as complete as possible. People are encouraged to share information they know or remember about the objects, including who or what is depicted in the many photos.
