Hi Everyone,

For several months, I have been working with Naoko Fujii and Carol Kawase and others to identify descendants of Issei who were detained under the Alien Enemies Act (AEA) during World War II. Invoked by President Roosevelt after the attack on Pearl Harbor, the AEA allowed for Issei (as well as German and Italian nationals) to be apprehended and held in Justice Department or Army-run camps without due process. We also seek descendants of Japanese Latin Americans (JLA) who were taken from Latin American countries and imprisoned in the U.S. as enemy aliens under the AEA.

Our work group has since turned into the JACL Social Justice Action Committee, and we are focusing on matters related to the Alien Enemies Act, Birthright citizenship, and Alien Land Laws. This article focuses on the descendants of the Alien Enemies Act (AEA).

The descendants of the approximately 17,000 Issei detained under the AEA will be part of our amicus brief (i.e., "friend of the court" brief by those who are not a party to the case but offer a particular perspective to help the court make their decision.) to the U.S. Supreme Court. This brief is in support of the ACLU's case challenging the use of the AEA to deport Venezuelan immigrants to El Salvador. Our goal is to prevent

The identification process has been tricky because we do not seek descendants whose Issei relatives were incarcerated solely under Executive Order 9066; the authority used to incarcerate over 120,000 Japanese Americans. That is why we ask that AEA descendants confirm their relative's name(s) in the Ireicho Book of Names: https://ireizo.org/#

Jeff and I would love to see as many descendants as possible from Oregon included in the amicus brief. Let's do this! Thanks so much for your consideration.

Interested? Here's The Process

Please note: This is not for the 120,000 Japanese Americans who were incarcerated under Executive Order 9066 only in War Relocation Authority (WRA) camps (Amache, Gila River, Heart Mountain, Jerome, Manzanar, Minidoka, Poston, Topaz, Tule Lake, Rohwer) and Wartime Civil Control Administration (WCCA) detention centers (Fresno, Marysville, Mayer, Merced, Owens Valley, Pinedale, Pomona, Portland, Sacramento, Puyallup, Salinas, Santa Anita, Stockton, Tanforan, Tulare, Turlock).

However, this group does include Japanese Latin Americans forcibly brought to the U.S. This group also includes Japanese detained/interned in Hawai'i who were sent to Department of Justice or Army camps in the continental U.S.

To determine if you are a descendant of Issei detained under the Alien Enemies Act (AEA), Please Do The Following:

 Check for your relative's name in: https://ireizo. org/

- If your relative was only in WRA and WCCA camps (underlined above), they are not eligible.
- If your relative was imprisoned in city/county jails and other sites instead of or in addition to WRA/WCCA camps, they are likely eligible.
 A few examples of these include the Los Angeles County Jail, Tuna Canyon, Sharp Park, Ft. Missoula, Ft. Lincoln, Santa Fe, Lordsburg, Ft. Sill, Angel Island, Camp McCoy, Camp Livingston, Ft. Meade, and Crystal City.

If it's unclear from the Ireizo entry, search your relative's name at: https://catalog.archives.gov/id/720246

Look for their internment card for the chronological order of camps: (not all people will have an internment card)

Next Steps: Sign-Up Instructions

- If you believe you are eligible and you would like to include your name in this important legal effort, please complete the Alien Enemies Act descendants sign-on form. Include all required details, including your street address, city, and state, as this is needed for a legal conflicts-of-interest check by the pro bono legal team.
- We kindly request that each relative sign up using this link: https://shorturl.at/UDGUI
- We are looking for as many blood-related adult descendants of the Issei taken under the AEA as possible.

After you sign up, in the late summer or fall, you will receive:

- A final draft of the amicus brief for your review.
 The draft will have already been reviewed by
 5 JA attorney-descendants, including Peggy
 Nagae (Min Yasui coram nobis attorney) and
 Dale Minami (Fred Korematsu coram nobis attorney).
- You will be asked to sign a short "amici" agreement (adults only) officially confirming your permission to list your name in the amicus brief, which will be a public document and submitted to the U.S. Supreme Court.


